Jaycees To Sponsor 'Walk For Mankind'

Farmington schools will cooperate with the Farmington Jaycees in a Walk for Mankind next fall.

TAX ANTICIPATION NOTES

Sealed bids for the purchase of tax anticipation notes of Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, Michigan, of the par value of \$3,000,000.00 will be received by the undersigned at 23500 Shawansee Street, Farmington, Michigan, until 7:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on the 1st day of August, 1972, at which time and place there will be publicly opened and read.

The notes will be dated July 21, 1972, will mature March 15, 1973, and will bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 8% per annum. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan to be designated by the original purchaser of the notes which paying agent qualifies as such under the Statutes of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government, subject to the approval of the Farmington Public School District. Denominations and form of notes to be at the option of the purchaser. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such notes must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

The notes shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the notes from August 1, 1972, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The notes will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest dollar interest cost to the municipality. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the notes or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

The loan is in anticipation of the 1972 School District Tax due and payable December 1, 1972.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of 2% of the par value of the notes, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid be accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the notes. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of the purchaser's attorney approving the legality of the notes, to be secured at the purchaser's expense. The purchaser shall furnish notes ready for execution at his expense. Notes will be delivered at a place to be agreed upon with the purchaser. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.
