"I am opposed to court-ordered busing for racial balance and I support the proposed welfare work program," he said. "My priorities are to promote coordination between departments, eliminate duplication and keep the budget down."

DISTRICT 25

Two Democrats and five Republicans are running for the seat in this district which includes parts of Commerce, Farmington and West Bloomfield Townships.

MARGARET M. GELINAS, 32, of 1470 Sunset Dr., Walled Lake, Democrat, is chairman of the village planning commission, a member of the housing committee for representative government (non-partisan) founder and member of Southwest Oakland Planning Federation and a member of the Michigan Society of Planning Officials. She attended Schoolcraft College.

"The control of the ugly urban sprawl in the developing areas of the county will depend upon the policies we establish at the county and local level now," she said. "The county should adopt and effectuate a comprehensive land use plan developed in conjunction with local units of government."

"We should make more effective use of road funds with emphasis on existing unsafe road conditions."

"We should reform and restructure county government."

JACK D. ROSE, 47, of 700 Bogle Lake Rd., Milford, Democrat, is employed in a management position at Allied Supermarkets. He is past member and secretary of White Lake Planning Commission, the chairman of the White Lake Taxation Commission and Democratic Club and Beautification Committee. He was an aid to a former state representative and a member of the 19th District Steering Committee.

"My first concern is District 25 and its future growth," he said. "We are the future of Oakland County and must plan so as to have all growth such as commercial industry and subdivisions on an equal pattern."

EDWARD J. HOLMES, 36, of 604 Commercial, Commerce, Republican, was a Commerce Township trustee for four years and is a vocational education teacher in Royal Oak. He attended OCC and Western Michigan University.

"There is a need for better communication between county and local government," he said. "I would see that my

local boards are kept informed. There should be more help for juvenile problems and I would work toward improving this."

FRANK MOROTTA, 48, of 1847 E. Commerce Rd., Milford, Republican, is a licensed real estate broker, a journeyman plasterer, and a licensed builder and general contractor.

"County government could become more efficient by eliminating needless positions and re-distributing the work loads. I would work closely with people in state government in the interest of passage

of new bills to provide the county government with a more equitable split of state participating funds," he said.

LESTER H. MAYNARD, 52, of 1841 Hollingsworth, Walled Lake, Republican, is general manager of Scientific Brake Service, Detroit. He worked at the Ford Wixom Assembly Plant in cost analysis.

His priorities are: a closer coordination of drug programs, tax reform and a better road program.

PATRICK M. NOWAK, 33, of 3742 W. 12 Mile Rd., Farmington, Republican, is a

general agent with Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Co., was president of the Michigan Jaycees in 1970 and vice president of the U.S. Jaycees in 1971.

He is a past member of the Farmington Board of Review, past chairman of the beautification committee, on the board of directors of the Farmington Community Center and the YMCA.

He is Oakland County chairman for the re-election of Sen. Robert Griffin.

"The most pressing needs are to determine the extent of growth and to make responsible and visionary plans to meet those needs. Powerful posts, like drain commissioner, should be brought under the administration of competent professionals and not left in the hands of power-seeking amateurs," he said.

MARGARET STEVENSON, 42, of 418 Wolverine Dr., Walled Lake, Republican, is a teacher with experience in homeowners associations, PTA, church and Scouts. She has a BS from Mercy College.

Her priority is efficient planning. "We must act now," she said. "We have a serious responsibility to utilize all state and federal assistance available to utilize all state and federal assistance available to preserve and improve our lakes...some roads need maintenance."

DISTRICT 27

A Democrat and two Republicans are seeking nomination in this district which includes part of Farmington and Southfield.

WILLIAM HATTON, 44, of 3458 Nine Mile Rd., Farmington, Democrat, is a senior research chemist for

M&T Chemicals. He is past president of the Farmington Township Road and Civic Association, chairman of the sidewalk committee and a board member of the Future Farmington Association.

"I shall strive to bring the various autonomous boards and commissions under a county administrator answerable to the elected representatives of the people, the commissioners," he said. "The county needs adequate solid waste disposal facilities for its million people. This will require a major expenditure of money and effort during the next two years."

AUGUST BARBRICK JR., 35, of 3744 Schulte, Farmington, Republican, is the owner of Augie Barbrick Enterprises and a manufacturers representative. He is a past state vice president of the Jaycees, a past key precinct chairman for Oakland County to re-elect Sen. Griffin, a Republican delegate to county and state conventions and a YMCA volunteer.
