

Griffin Calls Kelley Part-Time Opponent of Forced Busing

By STEVE BARNABY FARMINGTON U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin, a Republican, keynoted his campaign against state Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley Friday night by saying Democrat Kelley was a part time attorney general and that as far as busing was concerned, Kelley's heart wasn't in the case.

Of the Roth busing decision to integrate metropolitan schools, now being considered in the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati, Griffin said:

"We need a full time attorney in Cincinnati. Kelley endorsed busing after the first ruling in the Roth case. He said at that time he supported the immediate implementation of busing."

Griffin addressed a crowd of more than 500 enthusiastic anti-busing supporters at an hour-long outdoor rally sponsored by the Farmington Voters Alliance and held at Oakland Community College.

THE SENATOR endorsed congressional and court action for the anti-busing advocates. "We need the best case

possible in Cincinnati, but that's not good enough," he said. He reassured the crowd that even though Congress might not have the anti-busing votes this session, a McGovern defeat in November will bring more a Republican congressman to Washington so busing can be stopped.

Griffin questioned Kelley's stand on supporting the president's proposed moratorium on busing, withdrawing jurisdiction from the federal courts to enforce busing, and the constitutional amendment outlawing busing.

At the conclusion, Griffin urged the enthusiastic crowd to be prudent in their actions, to keep their heads and not listen to those who advocated lawlessness to obtain their goals.

"We can change the law and be a force for peace and reason in the home, neighborhood and community," said Griffin.

FORMER NAG Attorney L. Brooks Patterson, a Republican candidate for Oakland County prosecutor, brought the audience to their

feet in loud cheers when he referred to busing as the yellow flag and stressed that intra-city busing is as bad as cross-district busing.

"There is no moratorium if there isn't any legislation. Don't go home and abandon Pontiac and Detroit. If they divide us, they will pick us off one at a time," said Patterson. There was another standing ovation when Patterson attacked the Michigan Education Association-endorsed proposal to end school property taxes which is supported by Gov. William Milliken.

"When the governor makes his annual labor day walk across the Mackinac Bridge, let's meet him with one or two thousand people in the middle and ask him about it," said Patterson.

Several of the crowd came off. Former State Sen. Robert Huber (R-Troy) made a short speech praising George Kuhn, former state senator and candidate for the Oakland County clerk commissioner. Haber sought the 18th Congressional District

nomination Tuesday. OTHERS SPEAKING at the rally were U.S. Congressman William Broomfield and the chairman of the Farmington Township charter commission, Robert McConnell. All speakers were Republicans.

U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Waterford) who was scheduled to speak at the meeting, didn't show up but was heavily endorsed by Colorado Congressional Candidate Sam Cavness, chairman of a Colorado anti-busing group called Project Bus Stop.

130 Plant Tours Available In State

If you like plant tours, there's a wide variety to choose from in Michigan, ranging from auto assembly to nuclear energy plants, according to a survey prepared for Automobile Club of Michigan.

It would take more than 10 days to visit approximately 130 plants which welcome visitors, allowing a meager two hours for each and not counting travel time between cities.

Some 46 of the state's cities offers tours, many several. Surprisingly, Grand Haven offers 17 tours, more than any other city, with 12 Grand Rapids second, followed by

Kalamazoo, Lansing, Livonia, Tecumseh and Ypsilanti. Automotive parts areas are AC Spark Plug in Flint, Chevrolet Spring and Bumper in Livonia and the hydraulic Division of GM at Willow Run.

Retired LNB Head Dies at 79

Guy Spencer, 79, former president of the Livonia National Bank, prominent in Michigan banking circles and in service club activities in Livonia, died Sunday in Venice, Fla. He retired from the Livonia bank in 1964 and moved to Florida shortly thereafter.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday in the Greer Funeral Home in Ypsilanti.

Mr. Spencer, a former commissioner for the Michigan State Banking Department, was one of the incorporators of the Livonia bank in 1952. Prior to that he had served as president of the First National Bank in Ypsilanti.

During his years of service as head of the Livonia bank he was president of the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He was a past president of the Michigan Bank Commissioners Association.

His wife, Mary, died a year ago. Surviving are: a son, Jack of Jacksonville, N.C.; two daughters, Mrs. Peggy Wheaton and Mrs. Mary Lynn; both of Ann Arbor; five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.
