A section of the Rouge River will be cleaned out again this year — this time on Sept. 16.

DPW Director Dave Jones told the Farmington city council Monday night that this years efforts would be concentrated in Section 4, between the Grand River bridge and Nine Mile Rd.

Volunteers are needed for the project, Jones said.

Last year, more than 400 persons labored on a Saturday to haul away about 35 truckloads of debris, all taken from the river.

"It has really helped the river, because it is flowing freely," Jones said.
