# McConnell Tells Plans

"The charter can — and will — provide a period of transition, with specific instructions," McConnell said.

McConnell said the township faced many problems, including the expiration of a two mill levy for public safety next year. "About 50 per cent of our budget goes there," he noted.

"The point I emphasize is that we must protect our boundaries. Unless you have home rule, you can't provide the kind of protection of our tax base that is needed."

"Nor do we have control

over roads or drainage; those are handled by the county. We get about 90 cents on the dollar from Oakland County from gas and weight tax, and roads are a major problem in this area," McConnell said.

McConnell had high praise for the Boundary Commission, with which he has been in "constant contact."

He said boundary commission chairman Dave Calhoun had helped them a great deal; he singled out Irving Rozin, of Plymouth, as being "very helpful."

McConnell said he was a scientist and as a consultant to manufacturers.

ON POLITICAL ISSUES, McConnell said defeated supervisor Teeple had failed to take a stand on the charter and had attended only "four out of 10 charter meetings."

"Mr. Teeple complained that the township board wouldn't work with him. It's the old cliché of who is out of step — Sammy, or the whole army. I notice the other incumbents (Thomas Nolan, Floyd Cairns, Fred Lickman and Margaret Schaeffer) all won re-election."

"I think one area Teeple's let the people down in was the master drainage plan. That was authorized two years ago, and it's still not finished," McConnell said.

McConnell said he ran an "independent" campaign until Teeple had promoted an anti-establishment slate, opposing the other incumbent township officers.

At the last minute, McConnell joined a slate with incumbents Floyd Cairns (clerk) and Thomas Nolan (treasurer). "But all of that is over. The charter is more important than the politics of the situation," McConnell concluded.

# Pontiac People Discuss Their Story

She said her son was harassed by the women because he didn't have a card, and a woman verbally attacked her when she accompanied her son the following day.

"So many people say they will fill up the jails rather than put their children on a bus," said another woman. "Their attitude is really frightening."

"There is no such thing as 'forced' busing," said Rev. James Sheehan, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Church and vice president of the Pontiac Concerned Clergy. "The students can get to school any way they want. What we had was forced segregated education."

He said that by November the uproar over busing had died down in Pontiac.

"When the papers and TV back off, the school thing quiets down," he said.

DID BUSING help Pontiac students?

"I think it made them grow up, maybe a little too fast," said Barbara Jones, a black Pontiac teacher and parent. Merle Smith, of the Pontiac School District research department, said Thursday that studies made between February and June show that:

• There were no significant differences in achievement between students who were bused and those who were not bused.

• Relations between students of different races have improved.

• Students scored an average of two points lower on the state assessment test, given to all fourth and seventh graders in Michigan. Smith said this was "due in part to the fact that we lost some of our better students who moved away."

• The large majority of the parents felt the quality of education has not deteriorated since busing took effect.

• Black parents were mostly more positive than white parents in their attitude toward busing.

MRS. JONES was one of many parents who volunteered to stand in the halls during the first weeks of busing in Pontiac.

"At first the students resented it," she said. "They asked 'Why are you policing

us?' We told them we weren't policing, we were there because we care about them."

"The secret is to get to the kids individually," she said. "When we saw a black kid with a chip on his shoulder pushing other kids, we would tap him on the shoulder and say, 'Are you working for Irene McCabe? You are making an incident just like she said.'"

Eventually, she said, the volunteer parents were accepted by the students.

IN ADDITION to taking hall duty, Mrs. Jones said the PTAs of schools in a busing cluster held joint meetings and arranged drivers to take children who became ill home.

"But there should have been more exchange of parents before school opened and some orientation for teachers," she said.

She told of the attitude of one white teacher which had offended black students. "The teacher said 'We had to take you out here so you should be glad you're here,' when the black student was very frightened and confused and not at all glad he was there," she said.

Jack Lindley, a white parent, said his son was scheduled to go to the junior high school with the worst reputation in the city so he was glad to see buses come and take him to another school across town. He said several of his neighbors kept their children out of school during the first week but eventually put them on the bus.
