



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

high, they will chew bottle caps."

REV. RIDEOUT who will coordinate local drug programs on a state level in Washington, said his experience in starting and following Farmington's program through its growing pains should be helpful.

One of the common problems of growing drug help programs is upsetting the balance in relations between the youth, which the program is designed to help, and the city fathers, school and county officials who fund it, he said.

In some cases, he said, a close association with the "establishment" has turned off the youth. In other cases a close association with the youth and lack of communication with city fathers has turned off the funding.

He proudly says Rap Line has maintained the delicate balance.

"I have friends in the youth culture and in the mature community," he said. "We have a good reputation among the freaks and a good working relationship with established agencies."

"The gap doesn't need to exist. I've seen kids who hang around here become close friends with some of the board members. When they see adults in a relaxed atmosphere their fears and mistrust disappears."

He sees increased coordination between the 24 drug help centers in Oakland County in the future.

The centers have applied for almost \$1 million in Federal funds for "clinical types of service which would be offered to satellite centers like ours in a county network."

REV. RIDEOUT, encouraged by the new Youth Assistance and Youth Employment services, said "I am pleased with the direction I see Farmington taking at this time. I see Farmington becoming more aware."

"We have 61,000 people and that's a lot of human problems. The community needs human services as well as roads and sewers."

"My dream," Mr. Rideout said, "is for all of us to take more seriously the responsibility we have for the world we live in."

"My dream is to recognize the bond we have. If we don't work out human relations on a local or state level, we are in trouble."

Hot Line Now Serves Library

ROCHESTER Southfield and Farmington libraries are among all public libraries in the county served by the Oakland County Reference Hotline.

The experimental project, funded by a \$25,000 federal grant, provides rapid reference, loan and photocopy services. A telephone number provides direct access to a librarian and assistant based at Oakland University's Kresge Library.

Any library faced with a question its own resources are inadequate to handle can call the reference hotline at no charge. All needs are filled within 24 hours.

THE HOTLINE handles requests for a specific book, periodical articles or further information. The staff has identified obscure historical figures, defined slang words and terms, quoted federal and state laws, identified new corporations and dated old books.

Books of a more scholarly, scientific or technical nature have been provided for public libraries. These are mailed the same day they are requested. Also mailed the same day are articles from technical journals, copies of pages from reference books, bibliographies, indexes, government documents and pamphlets.

Robert Gaylor, acting dean of the library, is administrator of the project. Lois Reilly, head of the reference department, is associate administrator. Constance Kelmenson is Hotline Librarian.

Miss Kelmenson has visited libraries served to discuss what Hotline can do to supplement service in each community. She is available to talk to local, civic or private groups.

She urges members of each community to take advantage of the new service by patronizing their local library.
