Charter Vote hot line In November?

Tax limitation--the most controversial portion of the document--is yet to be decided.

Will cityhood for Farmington Township be on the November ballot? Charter commissioners working on the proposed charter for "Farming-ton Hills" have agreed among them-selves to vote on that question Sept. 1, according to Commission Chairman Robert McConnell Robert McConnell.

The question of a tax limitation for the charter-the most controversial portion of the document, the commissioners feel-is yet to be decided.

The tax limitation and the "catch all" city ordinance section are the last to be written, according to McConnell.

COMMISSIONERS have been meeting twice a week since the township primary election. Both candidates for Republican nomination for supervisor are on the charter commission—McConnell and Earl Teeples, whom McConnell defeated in the primary. Commissioners agreed to the stepped-up schedule until Sept. 1, according to McConnell.

"We decided to go to city finances, and then come back to taxes," McConnell said.
