

# 'Walk For Mankind' Is Coming Next Month

FARMINGTON Some 2,000 Farmington will be "walking for mankind" Oct. 7 if sponsors of the charity drive have their way.

The project is being guided by the Farmington Jaycees, with the cooperation of other area service clubs, walk director Worth Robbins said.

THE "WALK" is to raise money for "project concern" and for local charities which will get one-fourth of the proceeds, according to Robbins.

"Project concern" is a medical group that runs clinics in underdeveloped areas of the world, including Hong Kong, Mexico and South Vietnam, providing medical

services to the poor in these areas.

Started by a California physician, "project concern" now has 150 doctors, nurses, technicians and part-time volunteers working in the clinics.

The "walk for mankind" involves recruiting area youth to walk on a 20-mile course around Farmington, Robbins said.

The walkers will get money

from their "sponsors," who will pledge money for each mile walked.

THE JAYCEES are going to be speaking at school assemblies to the area to encourage kids to participate and are contacting service clubs for help with the march. They are working out of an office at 3260 Nottingham, Farmington.

"We don't want people to get

the idea that we are going to run it all alone," Robbins said, "We need help."

Members of the Jaycee committee working on the march are: Phyllis Wilcox, secretary; Warren Brown, treasurer; Allen Brown, public relations; Neil Wilcox, youth involvement; Milton Graves, registration; Charles Steyer, route supplier; James Hyatt, refreshments, and Lee Arthur, proceeds sharing.

## Student Round Table Will Have New Rules

FARMINGTON Student Round Table will be operating this year under a new set of guidelines approved recently by the Farmington School Board.

The board turned down an amendment offered by member Aldo Vagnozzi which would have given board committee chairmen discretion to call in student Round Table representatives as advisors.

VAGNOZZI CHAIRED a study group which recommended the guideline changes in the Round Table.

The Round Table began meeting in February but was criticized by participants as too inflexible.

"Last year ideas were initiated at the Round Table and died at the Round Table," Vagnozzi said.

He said allowing board committee chairmen to call in student advisors from the Round Table would give students an outlet for their ideas.

The board changed Vagnozzi's proposal at a study session last month to allow board committees, rather than committee chairmen, to call in the student's advisors.

Wednesday, Vagnozzi tried unsuccessfully to reinstate his original proposal.

HIS MOST vocal opponent was board member Ronald Emmitt, who seemed to fear that Vagnozzi's proposal would result in a permanent single student advisor on a committee and eliminate input from other students.

"This is why I do not favor putting a young person directly on the board as an advisor," he said. "At no time can six students maintain all the information this board needs from the students."

"In that case, I wonder if the matter we handle couldn't be handled just as well by any

seven other members of the community," said board member Mervyn Ross.

"Popular vote is the only democratic means to get representation."

That section of the guidelines reads: "Student representatives or alternates may be invited to serve in an advisory role with board committees at the discretion of the committee."

THE 12-MEMBER Round Table will consist of: two students from each high school with alternates, a high school principal, a superintendent and assistant superintendent and three members of the school board.

It will meet monthly and is urged to meet with the school board at a study session every two months.

Student governments will decide how their school's student representatives are selected.

Semi-annual reports must be made to the school board and representation of students, administration and board members are expected to report back to the groups they represent.

Several students who attended the study session at which the Round Table was discussed said they were pleased with the guidelines.
