



C'ville Band To Perform For 'Bowl'

Clarenceville's marching band, 130 strong, has been invited to present the pre-game and half-time shows at the third annual Police Bowl football game in which Livonia police oppose the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

The game will be played Saturday, Oct. 21, at Livonia's Bentley High School at 7 p.m. Tickets will be available at the gate and are available now at the Livonia Police Department.

Aside from Clarenceville school functions this year, the band's performance at the Police Bowl will be its first public performance this fall.

The band's last appearance at a non-school game was its performance at the Detroit Lions - Philadelphia Eagles game in Detroit last December.

Under the direction of John Nettek, the band will appear with one drum major and four majorettes.

Other football-day activities for Clarenceville bandmen have included appearances in band day festivities at Big Ten games at the University of Michigan and Michigan State.

C'ville Teacher Pay Hikes: 2.2 To 5.5 Pct.

Clarenceville teachers were voting today on a new contract with an overall pay increase of three per cent or more.

The board of education ratified the contract at a public meeting last week, but Supt. David McDowell refused to reveal any details until a joint announcement could be made by the board and the teachers union.

Nevertheless, Observer Newspapers was able to learn these details:

•The contract was for one year, although the school board had sought a three-year pact. It was the third single-year pact for the 160 teachers.

•Starting pay for teachers with a BA degree will be raised to \$8,500, about 2.2 per cent more than last year's \$8,320. The 1970 pay level was \$8,000.

•Teachers with a BA degree will receive \$14,100 in the 11th step of experience.

•Beginning teachers with the MA degree will receive \$9,200.

•Experienced teachers with MA's will get \$16,300 in the 11th step, an increase of 5.2 per cent over last year's \$15,496. The 1970 level was \$14,900.

•Teachers won more flexibility for their curriculum days - five afternoons a year. In the past, they

often had an outside speaker which many considered a waste of time.

LEO DAL BO, president of the Clarenceville Education Assn., the teachers' union, said a vote scheduled for 4 p.m. Monday had to be cancelled because of a lack of a quorum. Previous commitments prevented some members from attending, Dal Bo said.

Supt. McDowell, board members and union leaders stuck by their deal against revealing any major features of the pact until both sides had been ratified.

Agreement was reached by both sides a full three weeks ago. Nevertheless, there were leaks on both sides. It was known, for example, that an administrator delivered a copy of the salary schedule to a neighboring school district, and McDowell himself slipped by revealing in the agenda that the contract would be for a single year.

The new contract reflects the stiffening position of school boards and taxpayer resistance to big pay boosts. In 1970, the CEA won a 9.88 per cent boost, and last year's overall increase was about four per cent. This year's hike was more than three per cent but CEA negotiators thought they had done well under the circumstances.

'Mr. Whoodini' To Give Show

He became interested in magic in the fifth grade. From a hobby, the magic grew into a profession with Thompson working his way through college by doing magic shows. He attended Ferris State College and graduated from Central Michigan University at Mt. Pleasant with a speech major.

"Mr. Whoodini" flies a Cessna plane in order to make all of his nightclub appearances throughout the state. His act includes work in extensory perception, magic and hypnotism. For relaxation, his interests range from water skiing to softball and handball.

Jazz trumpeter Don Ellis is also bringing his band to the auditorium this weekend, for a

concert at 7:30 p.m., Saturday (Oct. 7). A few tickets are still available at \$3.50.

The box office in the auditorium will be open from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Thursday and Friday for sale of tickets to both shows. Ellis tickets may also be obtained at the switchboard in Schoolcraft College's Administration Building.
