

Prayer School Set

The Redford Baptist Church, Seven Mile and Grand River, Redford Township, will host a school of prayer Oct. 8 to 11, with Sunday services at 9 and 11:15 a.m. and weekday meetings at 9:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

The school will be conducted by the Rev. Roland Brown, a Baptist minister called a "prayer evangelist." He has just completed his 10th trip around the world, leading schools of prayer in 50 countries.

Dr. Gordon H. Schroeder, pastor, said Rev. Brown has visited Redford Baptist Church before and has been asked back because it was felt he "made a great contribution to the people's needs."

"It is our hope and prayer that all persons who attend these lectures might become more healthy, happy, serving and loving Christians for the glory of God," the pastor added.

The weekday morning sessions will be in two parts, a message on the basic principle of effective prayer and an experimental demonstration of these principles.

A nursery will be provided for all services.



Trinity Launches New Program

Trinity Episcopal Church of Farmington is launching a new program to bring all of its people closer together in their quest for Christian understanding.

Briefly, the program involves Thursday evening services for school aged children and young people, and replacing the traditional Sunday School with a Sunday morning service designed so families can worship together.

DIFFERENT GROUPS of parishioners will work each week on the Sunday service, which will begin at 10 a.m. and will include holy communion or morning prayer and a short sermon, followed by a one-hour program based on the scriptural theme of the day.

Communion services at 8 a.m. will continue as in the past.

There will be a nursery and optional baby-sitting for young children through the

second grade through the 10 a.m. Sunday services. However, young children will be welcomed in the family services if they wish to participate.

THE THURSDAY program, from 6:30 to 8 p.m., will be offered for elementary and junior high grades and will include joint activities and classes using the Joy Series from Mine Publications.

In addition to the Sunday and Thursday activities, there will be special programs as interest dictates. These might include study groups, social events and discussions of current social and community concern.

The Rev. John K. Hooper, Trinity pastor, said the new program was developed at an all-day meeting Sunday, Sept. 17, and is designed "to help Christians of all ages identify their mission as people of God and to give them a deeper understanding of the Christian heritage in terms of their own lives and values of others."

He added that Trinity facilities, located at 26880 LaMuera, are limited at present, but said plans are being developed for renovations and an addition to house the program.

Religion Update

While Christians are obligated to try to share their religion with all their neighbors, some manifestations of evangelism — particularly that directed to Christianity's parent religion of Judaism — can be exceedingly bizarre and nervy.

Take, for example, that latest manifestation of Jesus Freakery, "Jews For Jesus." It can be wondered just how charitably these fence-straddling ecclesiastical exhibitionists would react to the establishment, by Sammy Davis, Jr., and Elizabeth Taylor Burton, of a "Former Nazarenes For Moses" organization, or "Jews For Jesus — Who Was Jewish?"

In the New York area recently, several Jewish families received a somewhat startling letter informing them of their nomination by "some friends" for appointment to the advisory board of the American Christian College, the educational endeavor of the Rev. Billy James Hargis, the round and generally shouting

right-wing evangelist, of Tulsa. "WITH THE EXCEPTION of American Christian College, there is not a single college in America that takes ONLY students who have already established themselves as Christians," wrote the college's Dean H. Russell Grow — to his Jewish prospects.

"You will be doing us a big favor by accepting, and it will not take any of your time," added Dean Grow, reassuringly.

Very little time indeed. For this incredible letter went right on to spell out the duties involved in the honor of being an official advisor of American Christian College: "Our bank account is very low at the present time, and I must find approximately \$5,000 to pay some overdue bills," elucidated the Dean. "If you could send us a check for \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100, or \$250 today — Our seven-man Board of Regents is anxiously awaiting your reply."

IF DEVOUT JEWS are

appalled by such methods, so indeed are Christians of integrity — as they observe the increasingly widespread degradation of honorary degrees and trustee posts to the level of barter for fund-raising purposes.

There are ways of countering this — if enough proposed recipients of such "honors" can summon enough character to resist. As an example, one bishop received a letter informing him of the intention of Daniel Baker College (near Dallas) to award him the degree of doctor of divinity at its forthcoming commencement.

In the very next paragraph of this letter, the bishop was informed of yet another honor: he had been appointed chairman of his state's committee to raise \$25,000 for Daniel Baker College. The bishop immediately wrote back to inform the college that he would be delighted to accept both honors — with the understanding, of course, that 10 trustees of Daniel Baker College would serve as a committee to raise \$100,000 for his area's mission churches — payable any time before commencement day.

He never again heard from

Daniel Baker College — which subsequently went deservedly defunct.

IN NORFOLK, Va., a waterfront superintendent named William Dyson, a former pastor of several Baptist and Methodist churches, announced his establishment of the "American Academy of Clergymen," explaining that "Many are nominated but few chosen, and given the opportunity to use the Academy seal."

Dyson has subsequently expressed considerable chagrin that only two dozen of the 100 "chosen" clergy accepted the honor (at dues of \$90 — for the first year).

An equally enterprising (if non-profit) methodology was developed by the Rt. Rev. Alfred Banyard, Episcopal bishop of New Jersey. Until the Episcopal Church Annual informed him of their refusal to print such degrees, Bishop Banyard was honoring selected clergy with the degree of "Doctor of Divinity In The College of Brotherly Love."

Commented one of the bishop's more disgusted colleagues: "D.D.—L.D.—S.T.D.—and now Fiddle Dee Dee!"
