Contracts Awarded

FARMINGTON The Farmington City Council awarded contracts for a carport for the Public Safety Department and a truck and trailer for the Department of Public Services Monday. Milky-Way Industries was the lowest of three bidders for the six-vehicle carport with a bid of \$4,900. Other bids were \$2,100 from Commercial Carports and \$2,410 from Carefree Carports Inc. Roger Peck Chevrolet was the only bidder for a van type truck for the DPW. The \$4,176 bid was accepted by the council on City Manager Robert Deadman's recommendation. Deadman said that other companies didn't submit bids apparently because Chevrolet is the only company that manufactures a complete step van type vehicle. The second lowest bid of \$1,080 from Cyril J. Burke Inc. was accepted for a heavy duty cement mixer for the water and sewer department. The lowest bid of \$96 by Snyder Equipment and Supply wasn't acceptable because it didn't meet specifications. Plymouth Construction Equipment Inc. was the high bidder at \$1,129. A.J. Baxter & Co. was the only bidder for an earth boring drill for the water and sewer department. The bid was \$1,026 for a Thor Model 88-L earth boring drill with attachments.

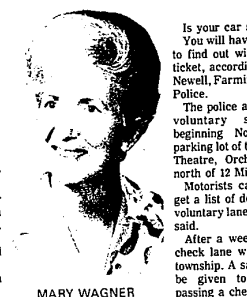
