Nowak Runs For County Seat

FARMINGTON

"My district is the most diverse in the county," says Pat Nowak, running for county commissioner in the 25th District which includes parts of Commerce, Farmington and West Bloomfield townships.

Running against Democrat Margaret Galinas, he says he expects to work for improved management of the county government, and to protect the "country" flavor of his district.

"The county board will have to take a view that will prevent what happened in Southeast Oakland County

from happening in the out-county areas," he said.

"If we don't, it won't retain its 'country' flavor much longer," he said. "The whole history of planning has been too little and too late."

NOWAK, a Republican, is a resident of Farmington Township and general agent for Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance.

He is past president of the Michigan Jaycees and former vice president of the U.S. Jaycees.

He is also a former member of the Farmington Board of Review, past chairman of the beautification committee, and Oakland county chairman for

the re-election of U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin.

To preserve open space, he says "There's got to be a central location."

"I don't want to halt services, but I would very much want to see some kind of a value for the tax dollar," he said.

He is concerned about what will happen to federal money under the revenue sharing program. "We need a plan for this money," he said. "Maybe it would be a good idea to use it to reduce local millage."

A county manager form of government appeals to him, and he favors a bill currently being considered by the state legislature which would allow counties to set up this form of government.

"I also intend to hold George

Kuhn to his promise that he will abolish the county drain commissioner's office if he is elected," he said.

Cat Fanciers Compete

Purebred as well as plain household cats will compete for awards at the fifth annual Farmington Cat Fanciers' show Nov. 4 and 5 at the Michigan State Fairgrounds.

More than 200 have been entered from Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Illinois, Indiana and Canada. Although interest centers on the championship awards to the coiffured, powdered purebreds, there are special prizes for just plain household pets of the non-pedigreed variety.

Their show will be at 2:30 p.m. Sunday with a trophy to be given for the best household pet entered by a child 14 years or younger.

The official show is open only to the 17 breeds of cats, all purebred, recognized by the Cat Fanciers' Federation. Judging is limited to coat and eye coloring, muscle structure, bearing and bone formation.

All championship requirements and rules will be observed.

Hatton Runs In County 27th

Oakland County should "stop building edifices" and concentrate on "people," says William Hatton, running as a Democrat for the 27th county commissioner district, which includes the City of Farmington and the southeast portion of the township.

Hatton, who is running against Republican Wilbur Brotherton for the office, is past president of the Farmington Township Road and Civic Assn. and chairman of the township sidewalk committee. He is a research chemist and ran for the office of township trustee in 1968 and 1970.

have control over the board of auditors," he added.

"The only one worth saving is the prosecutor's office - because of the public responsibility of the job."

He attacked the "edifices" being built by the county, such as a proposed "major airport," and the Oakland County jail.

He also criticized the expansion of the county hospital: "If it is needed, there are other ways it could be done. I hate to see complete control of health facilities in the hands of private business... it's a case of which is more efficient - the cost of additional beds, or the cost of the space in a private hospital."

He favors "services directly to the people," such as roads, police coordination and judges' staff as having "first

priority" in the county budget.

Second priority would be planning and recreation, he said.

Lastly would be "the comfort and well-being of county employees and facilities for judges, prosecutor, the sheriff and his prisoners."

Supplemental benefits to welfare recipients would rank "at least second priority," he said.

ALTHOUGH HE ranks roads among the issues of the county race, he says neither roads nor drains can be affected much by the commissioners.

"The initiative comes from the local unit, all the county

can do is to force cooperation," he said.

He also says the county board lacks control over the road commission, but he feels the county is being short-changed on state gas and weight tax rebates.

"We should go to court if necessary to get our fair share," he said.
