## Glass Collectors Get Together To Form Club

Norma K. Killinger, 31601 W. Chicago, Livonia, has been elected president of the newly-formed Michigan Depression Glass Society.

About 35 persons have joined the club, which will meet the first Monday of each month, at 7 p.m., in the Livonia Senior Citizens' Building, 15208 Farmington Road.

CLUB MEMBERS are looking forward to adding to their collection as more and more persons discover the fun of collecting this type of glass.

Depression glass is that manufactured and sold very inexpensively during the depression when the cost of cut and pattern glass was prohibitive for most people. Using a mold - etched process, this glassware was made in all colors and often had intricate patterns, but the glass itself was inexpensive. "Depression era" glass was produced at the same time using a better quality of glass, and people who collect this may also join the club.

But those who are interested only in cut or pattern glass or

china will have to look elsewhere for a group.

MRS. KILLINGER's interest began because she liked the pink glassware. For another club member, the red glassware was a good way of decorating her home. Both have since broadened their collections considerably.

Depression glass became scarce in the 1940s, and collectors are hoping, each time they go shopping to find something rare and therefore valuable. One rarity recently sold for \$1,000.

The definitive book on the subject so far, according to Mrs. Killinger, is Hazel Marie Weatherman's "Colored Glassware of the Depression Era."

At club meetings, members hope to sell, trade and learn together. Eventually, they hope to put on a show.

The other officers are Fran Cipri of Dearborn, first vice president; Jeanine Bahlow of Farmington, second vice president; Nancy Carlson of Livonia, secretary; and Bev Whitson of Farmington, treasurer.

The next meeting, set for Nov. 6, will feature a speaker and a display of examples of advertising in glass.
