Teeples failed to carry a single precinct, and was trailing 7,600 to 1,200. Most of his strength was in Precincts 2, 3, 5, 16 and 18. All but precinct 16 are in the southeast part of the township.

Thus, Teeples' political career was halted after a single two-year term as township supervisor. He was preparing, however, to charge that some voting machines were malfunctioning.

For the presidency, the township was giving about 80 per cent support to Republican Richard Nixon's second term bid. In the city, Nixon led 3,742 to 1,265.

City voters backed Sen. Robert Griffin, 3,536 to 1,418 for Democratic Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley. Griffin led about 2-1 in the township, too.
