GR Baptist Stages 'Other Wise Man'

"The Other Wise Man," a play by Henry Van Dyke, will be presented in Grand River Baptist Church, 34500 Six Mile, Livonia, at 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 9 and 10.

Mary A. Thornburg, educational director for the church, is producing and directing the Grand River Players in the drama, and James English is cast in the leading role of Artaban, the wealthy magi who spent his life searching for the Christ Child.

The public is invited to both performances. There will be no admission, but an offering will be collected to cover production costs. A nursery for babies and pre-school

children is planned both evenings.

THE PLAY is set in the Far East during the first century A.D. Artaban sells all his possessions to three Jews, a sapphire, a ruby and a pearl, and leaves his home and family to search for the Christ child.

As time passes, he finds it necessary to part with his three jewels in order to help people. He searches 33 years for the Christ, only to find him being crucified, but at the end of the drama he hears God say, "When you have done it to the least of these, my brethren, you have done it to me."

David Walkowiak Jr., Jr., assistant director and producer, and special effects and lighting have been handled by Wilson Davis. Mrs. John Morgan Jr. is in charge of scenery and James Ford and Ward Poindexter have a new stage for the production.

The so-called equal rights amendment, which has been passed by Congress as well as 22 of the 38 state legislatures necessary to amend the Constitution, seems on first reading to be equitable:

"Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state, on account of sex."

But apparently there is a growing number of organizations and individuals who now are giving this proposed amendment a second glance. For it is being opposed by the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, the National Council of Catholic Laity and the AFL-CIO, among others.

MARGARET MEALEY, executive director of 20 million-member National Council of Catholic Laity, told this column that the seemingly equitable amendment, if passed, will "destroy all the protective legislation we have fought for over the years."

Despite this position, Miss Mealey's name is listed on the first page of a pamphlet now being made under the franking privilege of the U.S. Department of Labor, from the Citizens Advisory Council on the Status of Women.

The pamphlet is a strong criticism of North Carolina's Sen. Sam Ervin, a noted authority on constitutional law, who has also opposed the equal rights amendment (ERA).

Miss Mealey is a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee — but the pamphlet makes no mention of her strong opposition to ERA, which omission she describes as "misleading."

APPARENTLY the majority of Congress and state legislatures who have voted for this amendment have also been misled — primarily by the forces of women's liberation. This movement, which has provided generally comic relief during the last decade of frequently savage protest, was recently described by Israel's Golda Meir as "silly."

And so it has often seemed — not only in its title's implication that U.S. women are somehow captives, but in demands that history be changed to "herstory," that playing cards, kings out-rank queens, and that any reference to the founding fathers is automatically sexist unless accompanied by a reference to the "founding mothers."

Such preposterous demands do more to suggest the truth in Freud's contention of some female envy of male anatomy than they do for the cause of reasoned equality.

SEN. ERVIN has noted a considerable amount of responsible — and hardly reactionary — legal opinion against the ERA, running from Roscoe Pound to Felix Frankfurter. And the senator's citation of the legal problems involved in imposing absolute equality standards on both sexes suggests a field day for wild litigation, should ERA be passed.

For example: Women could immediately

be forced to register for the draft — with no exemption from even the most hazardous combat duty.

• Labor laws protecting women from excessive weight lifting and long working hours could be eliminated.

• Fathers who desert their families could become exempt even from obligation to support their children.

• The tax exemptions for such sexually segregated organizations as the Girl Scouts, the YWCA, convents and monasteries could be endangered unless they become coed.

• Male prisoners in state or federal facilities could sue to end all sexual segregation — in order to establish coeducational cell blocks — as well as the delight of certain sexual aberrants as coed lavatories.
