

Trojan Band Gets Trip--If

Clarenceville's award-winning high school marching band will take part in the National Cherry Festival in Traverse City next July if members can raise most of the expenses themselves.

The school board last week agreed to underwrite the cost of gas and oil and to transport three school buses to transport the 140-member band. The salary of band director John Netzek will also be paid.

As for the other expenses like food and lodging, the band members will have to raise the funds themselves, it was agreed.

CONCURRING with the board's action was Netzek. "No way would we ask the school district to finance this trip," Netzek commented. "We raised the money for the

Washington competition and for a similar trip to Traverse City in '67-'68-and we'll do it again," he said.

Estimated cost of the trip is \$5,000. Netzek said he was hopeful of getting volunteer bus drivers which would cut down the cost considerably.

But before he does anything, the band director said he planned to poll band parents to see how many students are interested and available. If enough interest is shown fund raising plans would begin, he said.

Participation in the cherry festival July 9-14 is by invitation only. Select bands with outstanding reputations for fine performances have been invited to compete, the festival committee said. Kenneth G. Bloomquist, director of bands at Michigan State University, will be guest conductor.

But Not Detroit Busing OK -- To Walled Lake

To quote school trustee Ray Chaiken, it'll be like "going out first class and returning tourist."

But at least the 66 Clarenceville students will have some elbow room to eat their lunches on the bus while en route to area vocational classes at Walled Lake High School.

The board last week approved the request from high school Principal Ray Renbarger to add an extra bus to carry students to the school. For the trip back, however, they will have to jam into one bus as they now do.

The board granted the request when it was learned that the bus ride to Walled Lake also serves as the students' lunch period and that many of the students are forced to sit three in a seat.

"IT DOESN'T give them very much room," stated Supt. David McDowell, who added that he fought the request for the extra bus "since September until I learned that it is the only break these kids have between classes."

The school district will be reimbursed up to 90 percent of the cost by the state, it was disclosed.

In discussing the vocational classes it was revealed that Clarenceville has the highest attendance record of any of the schools transporting students to the classes.

"The kids are sticking to it and like it," commented Dr. Renbarger.

THE SCHOOL board also made two other decisions involving buses.

One was to authorize business manager Edward

Salisz to order replacements for two 1965 vehicles.

Salisz said the district has the opportunity to save a considerable amount of money if the order is placed by Dec. 22. Salisz said the bus company had offered to sell the bodies at last year's prices, which could result in a savings up to \$1,000. A similar offer was made by the company which supplies the bus chassis.

"Possibly, there could be a savings of \$100 to \$200 per chassis," reported Salisz.

THE BOARD authorized an emergency expenditure made by Supt. David McDowell involving the district's role in the Detroit integration plan. A resolution passed last Thursday officially authorized the school district attorneys, Dell, Shantz, Booker and Schulte, to carry Clarenceville's appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

The move to the higher court came when the appellate court recently turned down Clarenceville's plea and an appeal before the Supreme Court had to be filed within 90 days.

CHS Field House Too Costly

Budget-conscious Clarenceville Board of Education members have decided to wait until next year to make a decision on a new field house at the high school.

A look at the architect's plans for a new facility last week prompted the board to back away from any commitment for the time being. Estimated costs of the new facility are far more than the board had anticipated, according to board president Dr. Samuel Prisk. The board had figured spending around \$100,000 for the sports facility, including new bleachers, but learned from architects that the costs would be closer to \$260,000.

WITH STUDENT enrollment on the decline and the limited amount of time the field house is actually in use, the board agreed to hold a "study" session in January "to re-evaluate and set some new priorities" before making a final decision.

The board has already agreed to drop plans for new bleachers because of the cost. They also have tentatively abandoned plans to renovate the present structure, favoring instead a smaller but completely new structure. "These are some of the things we will take up at the study session," Dr. Prisk said. By that time, too, the district will have a budget printout on how much money is actually available to spend on the proposed facility, he added.

The district still has the spectre of tax reassessment and the refunds looming on the horizon.

2 Businesses Fined \$450

The Michigan Liquor Control Commission has fined two local businesses for selling to a minor and dismissed charges against a third local business.

The Quik Pik Food Store at 38675 Ann Arbor Rd., Livonia, was fined \$300 after a hearing in Lincoln Park on Nov. 21. A 15 day suspension of the store's liquor license was waived.

Marco's Inn, 38410 Grand River, Farmington, was fined \$75 for selling to a minor and another \$75 for a minor consuming liquor on the premises.

A charge on the premises being occupied after the legal hour on June 2, was dismissed against Cloverlains Bowl, 28900 Schoolcraft, Livonia.
