Elder Hanks is a former member of the First Council of Seventy, and was appointed to his present church position in 1968. In recent years, he has toured overseas military installations where Mormons are stationed.

He served as a leader of President Eisenhower's youth fitness committee. He will discuss the church's welfare program, which has given help in commodities and cash to the needy in an amount totaling almost \$18 million.

Labor donated for farm, food, and clothing production and helping the needy, sick and bereaved has amounted to more than four million hours. The program also offered work opportunities to many handicapped persons. This amounted to a million and a half hours. The overall emphasis is on helping others help themselves.

The Dearborn Stake provided \$6,552.84 in welfare aid last year to 161 recipients.

## Religion Update

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or of abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press ..."

The "free exercise of religion" has historically included the right of any U.S. citizen to confess to or counsel with a clergyman of his choice in complete confidence. If the courts ever begin jailing ministers, priests and rabbis who refuse to violate the secrecy of the confessional, the national uproar can be well imagined. Yet, with a few exceptions, the nation's pulpits have been muffled or unconcerned at the immoral spectacle of laymen who were jailed because as newsmen they refused to break a historic journalistic tradition of faith and violate a most sacred confessional obligation.

PETER BRIDGE of New Jersey and William Farr of California have refused to reveal the identity of their sources. To have done so would have been thoroughly immoral, as well as disastrously impractical.

CONNECTICUT'S Gov. Thomas Meskill apparently doesn't agree nor does President Nixon and (outrageously) his press aide Herb Klein, formerly of the Copley ("Let Freedom Ring") Newspapers.

In his opposition to proposed "shield laws" designed to protect the confidentiality afforded to a newsmen's sources, Meskill has contended that they will "instantly combine the functions of doctor, lawyer, clergyman, judge and jury in any man who holds a press card or who has \$1.50 to go out and get some printed."

Aside from the fact that effective and valid press cards are either unused by many newsmen - or considerably more difficult to come by than some forms of ordination, Meskill's observations should be of especial interest to the religion editor of the New Haven Register, the Rev. John Knoble.

Father Knoble is both a professional journalist as well as a priest and pastor. And apparently his governor feels that it is all right for the courts to force him to break confidences as a reporter - but not as a priest.

This resubmits one classic attempt to explain how a clergyman's perfect love could be without fear of governmental intrusion.

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be damned eternally: "Well, in his role as a just God, He does things that He wouldn't be caught dead doing as God of love!"

PERHAPS clergy would better appreciate the wisdom of the framers of the Bill of Rights, who included press freedom right along with freedom of speech and religion, if they realized how legally vulnerable the confidentiality of the confessional has been.

More than a decade ago, the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs in Washington, commissioned attorney A. Robert Theibaut to research all state laws relating to protection of confidentiality in pastoral counseling or confession.

Theibaut discovered that 17 states provided no legal protection whatsoever.

Moreover, he learned that in at least half of the states there were very definite qualifications to this protection - such as confining it to "confessions" made to a clergyman in "the course of discipline enjoined by the church to which he belongs."

Hence the case of one Episcopal clergyman who was threatened with contempt charges for refusing to reveal details of a divorce case told him by a parishioner in confidence. It was held that this priest was not entitled to privileged communication because the Episcopal Church does not have compulsory confession. This decision was later reversed by a higher court.

Speech can hardly remain free in any country where one cannot confide in either the Second Estate (the clergy) or the Fourth Estate (the press), without fear of governmental intrusion.

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
