

# Schoolcraft Seats Filled

Nancy Blatt of Livonia and Floyd A. Kehrl of Northville were appointed to five month terms on the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees filling vacancies caused by two resignations.

Mrs. Blatt, who has been an active supporter of Livonia schools, and Kehrl, retired vice president of National Bank of Detroit, will begin their terms at Wednesday's board meeting and serve until June 30.

They were selected from a list of 12 candidates including former trustees Dr. William Secord of Northville, Paul Nuttack of Clarenceville and Clark Oldenburg of Garden City, who indicated they would serve until the June 12 election if asked.

GERALD COX of Garden City was a third nominee. Because voting was done in order of the nominations, the two other nominees were elected before he was voted on.

The vacancies were created when Board Chairman R. Robert Geake was elected state representative from Livonia and Northville and Mary Dumas, board secretary, was elected Wayne County Commissioner. Both are Republicans.

Mrs. Dumas attempted to complete her Schoolcraft term, but an attorney general's opinion issued earlier this month advised her to resign.

The vote was unanimous for Mrs. Blatt, who was nominated by Paul Kaddish. Arch Valler nominated Kehrl, and Rosina Raymond and Jack La Rue voted against him. When Mrs. Raymond forced a vote on Cox after the appointments were made, she and La Rue were the only "yes" votes.

Mrs. Blatt, a Livonia resident for 15 years, was a co-chairman in the 1971 successful Livonia millage campaign and has been active in the parent-teacher groups. In 1972 she received a distinguished service award from the Michigan Council of PTAs. She resides at 19482 Parker.

Mrs. Blatt participated in the feasibility study for a vocational-technical high school in Livonia and has been active in the League of Women Voters and Northwest Communities Assn. for Retarded Children.

A LIFELONG resident of Plymouth and Northville, Kehrl graduated from Plymouth High School and has been both a farmer and banker. He retired as a vice president for NBD two years ago and lives at 41333 Eight Mile.

### NOTICE TO ELECTORS & TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON OF INTENT TO ISSUE BONDS SECURED BY THE CITY'S TAXING POWER AND RIGHT OF REFERENDUM RELATING THERETO.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the City Council of the City of Farmington intends to adopt resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of Special Assessment Bonds of the City, in the principal amount not to exceed in total Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of defraying the special-assessment districts' share of the cost of constructing street improvements in the City, and to issue General Obligation Bonds of the City, in the principal amount not to exceed in total Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of the City-at-large in connection with street improvements in the City. Said bonds will be payable in not more than 15 annual installments, with interest at a rate or rates not to exceed 6% per annum on the balance of the bonds from time to time remaining unpaid.

#### SOURCE OF PAYMENT OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENT BONDS

THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID SPECIAL ASSESSMENT BONDS shall be payable primarily, from collections of an equal amount of special assessments, and the bonds shall also pledge the full faith and credit of the City of Farmington.

In case of the insufficiency of said special assessments, the principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable from the general funds of the City or, if necessary, from ad valorem taxes levied upon all taxable property in the City, without limitation as to rate or amount.

#### SOURCE OF PAYMENT OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS shall be payable from the general funds of the City, and the City is required by law to levy sufficient ad valorem taxes, if necessary, for the payment thereof upon all taxable property in the City, without limitation as to rate or amount.

#### RIGHT OF REFERENDUM

THE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT AND GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS will be issued without vote of the electors unless a petition signed by not less than 10% of the registered electors in the City is filed with the City Council within thirty (30) days after publication by depositing same in the office of the City Clerk. Petitions for referendum may be filed for either the Special Assessment or General Obligation Bonds, or both. If such a petition is filed, the bonds against which said petition is filed may not be issued unless approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City voting on the question of their issuance.
