Turf Tips, Quips

It involves only a change in management but Michigan's harness racing activities switched from the old Northville to the 30th opening of the state's pioneer night, parimutuel betting operation at Northville Downs on Monday.

It will be the first of 39 monthly programs with racing continuing through Wednesday, March 14 when it will move from Northville Downs to Wabeyrie Raceway at the facilities of the Detroit Race Course.

With Jackson ending its most successful winter meeting at Northville tonight (Saturday) Downs Executive Manager John Carlson is looking forward to a big season.

There isn't any question in the minds of those close to the racing from that success on the Northville Downs campaign will depend entirely on the weatherman.

Jackson has had a tremendous January, primarily to the fact that the weather has been fabulous, especially on the weekends that mean the difference between a big week or an ordinary one. Business is better than average during the first four nights of a week but if the weather turns on Friday and Saturday...then the week can wind up as a flop.

The weekend attendance and wagering at the Jackson programs, over the half-mile Northville strip, have been the best in history. Especially was this true last weekend when a Saturday crowd of more than 5,700 set the betting to more than \$453,000...both highs for the year.

With a break in the weather tonight, the track could better those figures and wind up with a nightly average handle of

more than \$300,000. That, my dear folks, would be an all-time high for Jackson whether the meeting is at Jackson Raceway or at Northville Downs.

It also bears on the prediction that winter racing in Michigan can match that of most other midwest tracks...provided of course with a bit of aid from the weatherman.

CARLO has announced an 8 p.m. post time on the first race but plans to speed up the paces so that the 10th and final event will be over and have folks out of the clubhouse and grandstand no later than 11 p.m.

This means operating on a schedule of 20 to 22 minutes with the additional time used on the fourth, seventh and 10th race which will include perfecta wagering.

"We are going to set a tight schedule," said Carlo. "The weather, it will be that additional time will be needed on Fridays and Saturdays but other than that we'll have patrons on the way home by 11 p.m. on the remaining four nights."

The Downs has dropped the trifecta from its gimmicks for the winter meeting and has substituted a perfecta. There will be a daily double on the first and second races and then the perfecta on No. 4, 7 and 10.

The official family will be the same as that of last summer's meeting with the exception of one or two positions. The changes were

announced earlier and find Dr. Eugene Capuzzi replacing veteran Dr. Leonard Snow as track physician and Chuck Coon Jr. filling in for his brother Jerry as track superintendent.

JACKSON WILL FEATURE a \$4000 preferred race in its closing program tonight (Saturday) but the star of the past two weeks, Bedford Jet, isn't slated in the eight-horse field. The Jet romped away from competition in the last two Saturdays, winning each feature in times of 2:04.

But those victories caused others to back away from him in the finale and Driver-Trainer Gordon Norris didn't enter his star, leaving the field open to the other challengers.

Heading the field is Ertanas Valley, surprise winner of the \$10,000 finale of the early close pacing series in November and December; Adakin, veteran, rounding into top form after a late December slump.

Others are: Grove Stimer's H.T. Pilot, John MacDonnell's Grand G., Charley Norris' Ruml Valley, Elmer Conrad's Pepper Byrd and Mark Grismore's Action.

The all-pacing program also lists three other better than average races with purses of \$2,200 and two for \$2,000. It could well be the best closing night program ever presented by Jackson—at Northville and President of the General Manager Leon Slavin is looking for more than 6,000 and a handle of \$500,000.

That would be a perfect ending on a long campaign by the energetic Jackson boys who has been directing racing operations since last August without a break.
