Three new series of Lamaze classes will begin soon.

The first series of seven classes will begin Tuesday, Jan. 30, in the First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, 701 Church.

St. Edith Catholic Church, 15089 Newburgh, Livonia, is the location for the series beginning Feb. 15, and a third series will begin March 5 in the Plymouth Community Federal Credit Union.

The purpose of the classes is to train both parents for the birth of their child. Using the Lamaze method, qualified instructors teach neuromuscular control, effective breathing techniques and exercises to be used during labor and delivery.

The association also will have a public showing of the film "The Story of Eric" at 8 p.m. Friday, Feb. 9, in St. Edith.

Following the film, a qualified instructor and a couple who have used the Lamaze method will answer questions.
