

Raiders Topple GC East, 65-51

North Farmington is still in the running for the Northwest Suburban basketball title in the opinion of Raider Coach Ken Dean.

"Two losses will win this thing and three might get you a tie," said Dean after his Raiders upended Garden City East, 65-51. "This race is still wide open."

Franklin toppled John Glenn to place the two in a tie for first with identical 4-1 marks, while North is next in line at 3-2. East slipped into a tie for fourth with Oak Park at 2-4.

North lost to Franklin and Glenn in the first round and contends with Oak Park and Thurston before playing the two from runners back to back on Feb. 16 and 23.

Raiders also upped their overall showing to 8-4 in comparison to the 5-7 record they had last year at this same time.

Billy Joe Young's East Panthers, who are enjoying a five game winning streak since the start of the new year, opened up with a 16-13 first quarter edge. John Grigal scoring the first five points for East.

North's shooting game changed in the second quarter from a six for 17 to 10 for 15 and the Raiders jumped ahead, 35-28, at the half.

KIM PARKER scored 10 and Mike Deyar six in the 22 point explosion for North.

Parker scored 12 of North's 14 points in the third quarter to keep his squad in command as East hit for 17, Bernie Soya popping in seven.

North led going into the final stanza, 49-45.

"With 3 1/2 minutes remaining, John Grigal put in a two-pointer for East to tie it at 55-51. Soya and North's Dave Ellsworth traded buckets to make it 57-57.

Then came what both coaches agreed was the turning point.

A FOUL was called against East and the official ruled that the East player, having raised his arm, slapped it down too hard on his side and a technical was assessed.

Parker made the charity loss and North was given the ball. Kim Gasior then scored on a left-handed layup, making it 60-57, 2:40 remaining.

Jim Fredericks popped in another Raider basket to

increase it to 62-57 and the North victory was intact.

Each club scored 30 field goals, with the game being decided at the free throw line where East hit one of three and North five of eight.

EAST FINISHED 30 of 63 from the floor for 48 per cent and North hit 30 of 61 for 49 per cent.

"Both teams played excellent basketball," commented Young. "It was a shame one team had to lose. This had to be our second best ball game yet."

North won the rebounding battle, 35-28. Bruce Taylor was high for East with eight and Ellsworth high for the winners with 12.

Turnovers were at a low, with North collecting 12 and East only eight.

"We played well enough to win," said Young.

"We don't have a lot of talent this year but we have some of the biggest hearts," concluded the East coach.

EAST PLAYS at Franklin this Friday.

Young's Panthers beat the Panthers twice last year in their own gym. Once came during regular season action, 57-54, and the second was in the opening round of the district, 82-69.

The last time East played in the Franklin gym was when East captured the regional championship last March 10 against Detroit Northwestern, 55-51.

Bentley Drops 5th Straight

Bentley fell a notch deeper into a five game losing streak by taking one on the chin against Dearborn High in Suburban Eight basketball action, 56-46.

After piling up a 5-2 record, the Bulldogs have dropped five straight, three by not more than four points.

"We just got off to a bad start against Dearborn," said Bentley Coach John Farrar, whose Bulldogs beat the Dearborn five in the first round, 58-52. "We never bounced back."

"We were never in the game," he added. "Those close losses are taking their toll on us."

BENTLEY could muster only 11 points in each of the first three periods and only 13 in the final eight minutes. Dearborn hit for 15 in the first, 14 in the second, 15 in the third and 12 in the final quarter.

The Bulldogs shot 18 for 35 from the floor for 40 per cent, while Dearborn hit 20 of 52 for 38 per cent. The difference was at the line where Dearborn made good 16 of 21. Bentley hit on only 10 of 22.

Tim Bollin paced the rebounding game with 13 grabs as Bentley won the boards, 32-38.
