Camping In Winter Boomed By Parks

Camping – once considered only a warm - weather activity – is now one of the fastest growing segments of the winter tourism scene, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

A survey of all Michigan state parks and private campgrounds shows a 35 per cent increase in those staying open this winter as compared with a year ago. The greatest growth has been in the number of private parks keeping gates open year around.

growth nas been in the intime of private parks keeping gates open year around. This winter for the first time, private parks operating from December through March outnumber the state parks. There are 22 private parks staying open this winter. This is 37 more than a year ago, or a 65 per cent increase.

State parks staying open to service the winter camper number 65, an increase of five over last winter.

PRIVATE CAMPGROUNDS

MANY OF the private park operators staying open this winter claim that snowmobilers are a major reason flor the increased demand in camping space.

One of every three private campground operators responding to an Auto Club questionnaire stated that snowmobilers have access to trails from their parks.

Auto Club points out that the family which likes to snowmobile often owns a recreational vehicle that can be towed in winter to where snow conditions are losst.

Camping enables snowmobilers and skiers to reduce the cost of a weekend considerably.

camping maures showinouncer and saetes to reduce the cost of a weekend considerably. Nightly fees vary from a maximum of \$2.30 to a minimum \$1.50 at state parks and from \$2 to \$6 nightly at a private park.

These costs are well below the usual \$12 to \$18 nightly motel charge per couple.

MANY OF the private campgrounds offer monthly storage plans. Two Grayling - area parks – Pine Knoll and Yogi Bear – charge \$10 monthly to store a trailer on a campsite in winter. The camper pays only the \$4 nightly fee if the trailer is occupied.

Storing a trailer at a campground is economical and leaves the family car free to tow snowmobiles. Car gas mileage is cut in half in towing a medium to large sized trailer. Auto Club points out.

availability of heated shower and toilet buildings in addition to heated activities buildings. Currently, only four of the 65 state parks open in winter offer heated shower and toilet facilities. Sixty - nine, or 70 per cent, of the private parks have heated shower and toilet facilities. Twenty - seven private parks, or almost one of three, have heated activities buildings for public use. buildings for public use.

THE FAMILY that owns an unwinterized camping unit can have it made ready for comfort in sub - zero weather with a \$100 expenditure.

To provide extra warmth, auxiliary heaters - either electric or catalytic - can be usued. The cost of good auxiliary heating usually is under \$50. An inexpensive, portable electric heater can cost no mpor than \$15. Sleeping bags or electric blankets for the lower bunks are usually a good investment for those seeking comfort.

Most units without storm windows can have them added. Clear plastic sheeting can be used to cut down window heat loss by taping it to the frame from inside the trailer.
