repairable culverts, he said.

THE ACTUAL digging may be done by the residents themselves.

When McConnell mentioned the \$1.75 per foot cost the county would charge for the work, an audible groan came from the group.

Paving in the area has also been considered in the past, but a counter-petition killed the most recent effort.

A rough estimate on paving for the lot is \$5,000. "We'd just put a sign up on the house for sale," they said.

Real roads have never been laid in the area. Many are dirt, with no base even for gravel.

IN A RELATED program, McConnell cultivated a program to put first slag at \$5 a yard, then gravel, at \$1 a yard, on the roads.

About 300 yards per mile are necessary, he said.

A county program matches every yard of gravel, which cuts the cost in half, he said.

Another cost which some homeowners will have to bear is the cost of culverts under driveways.

An effort will be made by the township to get the pipe at cost—estimated at \$65-\$70 per culvert, McConnell said.

MRS. KRAUSE told the group the county would ditch houses where the owner did not cooperate with the ditching and "send them the bill," which answered one question on the program.

When ditching is completed, they expected natural watercourses in the area to do a temporary job draining away the water when it reaches the end of the ditch.

A permanent solution to this problem would be completion of a master storm drain for the area, McConnell said, adding the county would also attempt to answer this problem with the engineering work.

When several residents complained the county road grading program had been filling in ditches and scraping away the crown of the road, they were told the township was reviewing the program with the county.

MCCONNELL TOOK the opportunity to put in some mild plugs for cityhood, pointing out the township would receive about \$300,000 more a year for local street repair if it incorporated.

He added that street improvements in the area would be paid for by assessing local property owners regardless.

County Commissioner Wilbur Brotherton, who also attended the meeting, added in his experience as past mayor of Farmington, a city would not accept responsibility for streets until they were up to city standards. This was also county policy.

AS THE MEETING broke up, men began needing each other about their prowess with a shovel, and the three organizers were talking with the street "captains."

In spring, if all goes well the digging will begin. If successful, "Operation Shovel" might well be the biggest neighborhood project Farmington has every seen.

Farmington High Band Will Play

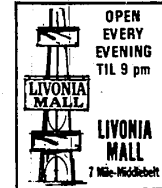
The Farmington High School bands and orchestra will present "A Festival Experience" Wednesday, Feb. 28, at 8 p.m.

Also performing Wednesday night will be the stage band, string class and Mexico band. The latter group plays a Mexico visit this spring.

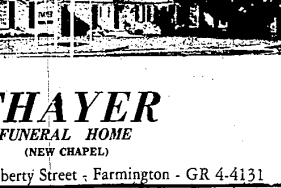
