Farmington High School students and local citizens generally turned out en masse on last Saturday for the big festival being given by the Junior class of the school, and the results obtained are a source of gratification to the promoters.

The fun started in the morning and continued throughout the day, opening with a three game tennis series in which Powers and Travis defeated Goers and Cox, which was followed by the races, with winners listed following: Bag race, Willard Travis; potato race, Norman Lee; wheelbarrow, Harold Steele and Howard Osmus; three-legged, Howard Osmus, Hugo Schuapeter; still race, Harley Schroeder.

Following the races, the fun wakers and takers adjourned to a big picnic dinner, a table for each grade and room being prepared.

In the afternoon the ball game attracted an even larger crowd from downtown, Farmington High playing the local town team and defeating them by the score of 15 to 6. Johnson and Maas of the town team formed the battery for the school.

The water battle followed and proved probably the most fun of all, Bicking, Pierce, Finch and Webster being declared winners, after the opponents said "enough." Ely, H. Johnson, Pauline and W. Johnson were losers.

A total of \$30 was cleared, \$10 of which applies on the old base ball debt, and \$20 on the piano fund, which reduces this debt to \$64.06.

The various stands carried on a thriving business throughout the day, and greatly helped to swell the receipts, being in charge in most instances of bevy of young ladies of the school.
