I could have saved you the express and besides you would have been patronizing a home store, which helps pay the taxes and builds up this locality." With characteristic frankness, the farmer asked: "Why didn't you patronize your home paper and advertise? I read it and didn't know you had the goods I have here, nor do I ever see your name in the local paper inviting one to come to your store."

"We will make errors—we will try to make friends, and we hope no enemies," was the way I expressed my hopes and beliefs when I first took charge of the Enterprise a little over three months ago. We have made our errors—they are inevitable. We know and are glad of the knowledge that we have made friends—lots of them and we're proud of everyone. And for the first time in Farmington we are forced to the belief that, hope as we might, the first enemy has been made. And all because of a pet belief of ours—that the salvation of a small country town lies in the patronage of the home merchant to the exclusion of the mail order house by home folks and home citizens. Enemies were never a hobby of mine—I like my friends and deplore the existence of enemies. But if they must be made, I am content in the belief that they have been made in my case in one of the biggest of causes and not at the altar of sacrifice of principle. No man can buy this principle—this belief, let him barter for what he will—for dollars, for bread or for printing. We can only conclude by hoping, that the little lesson we have tried to teach has been read and realized by at least the young people at whom it was directed—the future men and women of Farmington. And (class motto) "thus ends our first lesson."
