#### Curfew Ordinance.

Curfew Ordinance.

An ordinance to be styled "Curfew Ordinance" of the village of Farmington, Mich., to provide for keeping boys and girls, unless they are accompanial by their parents, from idly roaming the streets of said village.

SEC. 1—It shall be ulawful for child. ren, boys or girls under the age of 16 years, to idly roam in the streets of the village of Farmington unless accompanied by one of their parents, after 8:30 p. m. from April 1st to Oct. 1st, and 8:30 p. m. from Oct. 1st to April 1st, during 1914 and each year thereafter.

SEC. 2—It shall be the duty of the marshal, president of the village or any alderman or trustee to arrest any boys or girls who, in their judgement, are violating Section 1.
