## 1148 Arrested During Year

The report of sheriff Olivers showing the number of prisoners held in the county jail during the year ending June 30, shows a total of 1148 and the greatest number of arrests were made on charges of drunkenness, of which the total is 427. The next high charge is disorderliness, numbering 211 arrests. The other charges and the number of arrests on each are as follow:

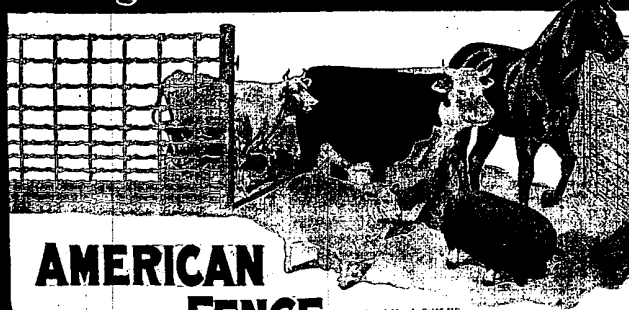

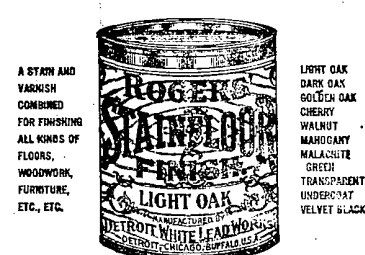
