Scott of No. 1715 Butler street, one of the oldest and most widely-known of railtroad cancineers in New Jersey and Pennsylvania "fired" and "engineered" his first locomotive, but the memory of the event is so vivid at this day that he has just completed a wooden model of the engine, using as tools only a file and a pocket lunife.

The model is three, feet long and is complete to the smallest detail, it is of what was known as the hookmotion type, built in the early forties and in use until the Civil War when it was finally "scrapped."

The original was built in England, and when put in service on the West Jersey Railcoad between Woodbury and Camden was nicknamed "Old Nine" from the large inscription on a brass plate attached to the boiler reading: "North American, No. 9."
