The United States Census De-partment at Washington has just issued a bulletin dealing with the ownership of Oakland county homes. The important facts contained in in the bulletin relative to this coun try are as follows:

There are 12463 homes in Oakland county, of this number 4796 are farm homes. The mortgaged farm homes are 1544. Renters oc cupy 1131 farm homes in this county. 7667 homes are urban there are 4066 urban home owners, 1185 are mortgaged, 2948 are free

of incumbrane, 3235 are rented.

The census enumerators were unable to secure data pertaining to the ownership of a small percentage of both the rural and urban homes in this county.
