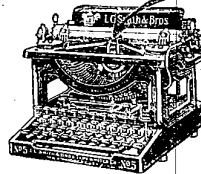
Mrs. William Parrish entertained the North Farmington Auxiliary society at dinner Tuesday. A good crowd was in attendance and a very pleasant day was spent.

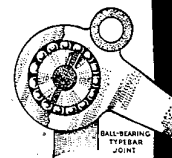
