JOHN WHITE IS BADLY FROZEN

Lays Through Night in Snow and Suffers Frozen Legs and Hand.

One of the saddest occurrences of the Christmas holidays, and of Thursday evening, when the thermometer dropped to fifteen degrees below zero, is the case of John White, aged 18, who is suffering from the effects of laying out in the cold throughout Thursday night, and who will likely lose one leg, which is badly frozen, as a result. The other leg and the left hand are also frozen, but hopes are entertained that they may be saved.

Stories vary, but as near as we can learn, young White came to the village Thursday evening, with the family of his cousin, Albert Sulkowski, and where he has been employed for the past three months. He did not return with them, but left the village at about eleven o'clock. The last he remembers is falling in front of the cemetery just west of the village and being unable to arise. It is about a mile and a half from there to the Sulkowski home, which he did not reach until eight o'clock the following morning.

His condition is indeed serious, and although everything possible is being done for him, it is feared that at least one of the frozen limbs will have to be amputated.

He is being cared for at the Sulkowski home.

LATER—At the time of going to press, the attending physician, relatives and friends, are holding out hopes that amputation will be unnecessary, as the condition of the frozen members has greatly changed within the last forty-eight hours.
