BECOMING A BRITON.

Easy For Aliens to Acquire Citizenship in England.

A large number of aliens become British subjects every year by taking advantage of the naturalization act. The process of taking out naturalization papers in England is delightfully simple. An application can be put through in a couple of weeks if good and sufficient reasons can be shown, while the average time, elapsing between application for a certificate of naturalization and other granting of permission to file the oath of allegiance to the king with the home office, which automatically confers British citizenship, is only about eight weeks.

The naturalization act of 1870 requires that the applicant shall have resided in the United Kingdom at least five years and shall intend, when naturalized, to continue to reside here.

The lease of a house or an apartment is sufficient to establish legal residence. The landlord's word is taken as sufficient proof. The applicant has merely to fill in a blank with the details of his residence and other information, and have the facts as to his residence verified by one British subject, while the applicant's respectability and loyalty must be vouched for by others. No then files the application with a £1 fee at the home office.

A special Scotland Yard detective is assigned to inquire into the case and examine all the statements on the applicant's account. Three months is allowed him in which to make his report, but a few weeks usually suffice. If the application is passed another fee of £2 is required. The applicant then has permission to file his oath of allegiance, which concludes the process.—London Tit-Bits

Archaisms in the Authorized Version.

In Psalm 131, 3, "Great is the Lord and our ravens, worthy to be praised." There should be no comma after "marvelous," which is an adverb qualifying "worthy." This correction has been made in recent prayer books.—London Saturday Review.

Good Road to Lansing

Oakland and Livingston counties have followed the lead of Ingham in accepting the proposition of R. E. Olds, wherein he will contribute \$300 per mile toward a good road from Lansing to Detroit, and it is probable that before the summer months have passed away there will be a first class road running between the two cities.

It will necessitate the building of 40 miles of road at a cost to Mr. Olds of \$12,000. In return for this, the highway will be named "Reo Highway". Some portions of the road are already in A shape, including the cement road out Grand River, which is joined by the gravel road in this township. The major portion of the work will be between Farmington and Lansing.

The news will be joyfully welcomed everywhere along the line, as a better highway between the state capital and the metropolitan city has been badly needed for some time. Work will be started on the improvement within a short time.
