MANY SURPRISES

Northville and Plymouth Vote Dry With Heavy Majority— Split Ticket at Redford.

What elections and voters didn't do to surprise dopesters and those who had supposedly inside in formation, wasn't worth while, in the annual village elections in surounding towns last Monday.

In both Northville and Plynouth, the biggest vote that has peen cast in years was polled, un-loubted owing to the submission of the wet and dry issue.

In Northville a total of 541 vote In Northylie a total of 34, very were east, the vote standing 301 for dry and 240 for wet. But on the other hand, what was teamed the wet ticket was elected by a neat majority, headed by Dr. Heu y. It is not mandatory that the ouncil follow the wishes of the voters in the matter of license, and whether licenses will be renewed there in May, rest with the new council.
