Farmington village officers publish their annual report in this week's issue of 'The Enterprise' for the first time in three years.

The local police reported every thing calm. Wednesday and even throughout the evening, even if St. Patrick was supposed to celebrate.

President Wilson has had to definitely postpone his visit to the Panama-Pacific exposition. We arrived at the same conclusion as regards ourself, about the time the big fair was first thought about.

The time of year rapidly approaches when you can expect to go home for lunch and find the dining room equipment receiving

an airing on the front lawn, and be allowed to work up an appetite for a cold lunch with the carpet beater.

And even in Detroit they have finally discovered that it takes more than hot air to build or buy a public utility such as a street railway—by about \$25,000,000. Should they purchase the lines, the city will probably get another lesson on the difference between gross and net profits.

If village elections held within the county can be taken as a criterion in the county local option campaign, and it is reasonable to presume that they can be, it looks very much like a settled fact that Oakland County will remain in the wet column after the coming election. The wet or dry problem was an issue in five Oakland county villages Monday of last week, and each of these five towns went wet with a very substantial majority. Further, these were not towns selected by the wets to wage battle, but the issue must have been forced by the opposing element, in view of the fact that the territory involved was at present in the wet column. If the only five towns where the issue was submitted voted wet, and they in various sections of the county, it would be unreasonable to presume that anything like a controlling percentage of county voters can be recruited over the remainder of the county to carry local option to a successful campaign.

Prohibition Does NOT PROHIBIT!

A very significant feature in the present Local Option campaign which gives a line on the sentiment on this question throughout Oakland County, can be found in the results of the different village elections held last week. In every case where the lines were drawn on the so-called Wet and Dry issue—

THE WETS WON.

From the experience in Genesee County, where the records of the Transportation Companies for the month of December last, show a shipment of 18,758 gallons of beer and 2,018 gallons of whiskey, brandies, etc., it would seem that the Pray law which makes necessary the registration of intoxicating liquors shipped into Dry territory does not have any appreciable effect on diminishing the number of such shipments. "Facts are stubborn things", and in spite of all arguments to the contrary, the figures of Transportation Companies conclusively prove that the Pray Bill does not prohibit the use of intoxicating liquors in Dry Counties. Since the Pray bill seems to have failed to accomplish in Genesee County what its ardent claimers for it, what reason have we to believe that the Leigh bill will be any more effective in this county?

The Leigh Bill DOES NOT Change The Law!

The principles of the Leigh bill in the main were the law during the time that Oakland County was Dry and as a matter of fact have always been the law. The conductor of an Interurban had the undoubted right to regulate disorderly conduct, such as drinking whiskey in the car. He always had the right to stop the car and eject disorderly persons whether the disorderliness came from intoxication or any other cause. So far as the practical operation of the cars between here and Detroit is concerned, the Leigh bill does not add one iota to the effectiveness. Conductors are hired for the purpose of operating cars and collecting fares and not for the purpose of being bouncers, pugilists, or general rough-necks. People who get on the D. U. R. cars have no right to expect that disorderliness of any kind will occur on the car and they have no right to expect that the cars will stop when they reach a village or other place in order that the conductor may hunt up an officer and hand over drunken individuals to his care. This article of the Local Option Committee shows that they expect disorderly conduct on the cars in case it goes Dry.

Prohibition does not Prohibit

Shall the Manufacture of Liquor and the liquor Traffic be Prohibited within the County?

YES means dry NO means Wet

The above question will be submitted to the Voters of the County of Oakland for their decision on Monday, April 5, 1915, on a separate ballot.
