

Attention of Anti-Local Option Committee of Oakland Co., Mich.

SIRS—Believing that a public discussion of the questions involved in the local option campaign in this county would be of interest and profit to the public, the Local Option committee of Oakland Co. submits to you the following proposition for your acceptance or rejection.

We will select two citizens, residents of Oakland Co., who will meet two citizens, residents of Oakland Co., to be selected by your committee, for a joint discussion of the following question: "Resolved that it would be for the best interests of the people of Oakland County for Local Option to carry at the coming election"

The representatives selected by our committee to take the affirmative and those by your committee to take the negative. The affirmative opening with 45 minutes, the negative following with two addresses of 43 minutes and the affirmative to close with 45 minutes. The expense of the hall to be divided equally between the two committees

This proposition is good for a joint discussion in the city of Pontiac, or for a joint discussion in two or more places outside the city of Pontiac, followed by one within the city of Pontiac, the same to be held during the week of March 22nd, 1915.

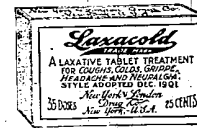
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
