To the Chairman LOCAL OPTION COMMITTEE

March 19, 1915.

(George H. Kimball,
Chairman:

Your communication of the 15th inst., a copy of which appears in the Press Gazette of that date, relative to a joint debate on the Local Option question, is received, and in reply would say that we cannot understand why you desire another joint debate. We understood you had a joint debate recently at the Howland Opera House. To us it appeared something like a fake debate and similar in some respects to a "Punch and Judy" show, but the Anti Saloon League dignified it by the title "Debate."

The Local Option question has already been discussed in three different campaigns during the last seven years. During those campaigns and a considerable portion of the time in between, the Anti Saloon League Orators and a majority of the Ministers of the County have been advocating Local Option strenuously, and so far at least, with very little success. In fact, the public taste seems to have become somewhat indifferent to your appeals. Your Local Option meetings are now being billed, we note, as "Picture Entertainments," all of which leads us to believe that the people have had about all they care to hear of your Local Option arguments and that this challenge of yours for a joint debate is to inject an element into the campaign whereby you may be enabled to secure audiences that you cannot otherwise obtain.

While of course, it is none of our business, we cannot see why you are anxious for a joint debate, since you have not been able to convince the people when you have had the platform practically to yourself. As I recall the principles of the Gods, the challenging party had the right to select the weapons, but according to your challenge, you not only select the weapons, but you arrange the whole manner of firing. One of the objections which I have had to the Local Option crusade is that it assumes to unduly regulate the ways and lives of other people, and this characteristic seems to stand forth even in your challenge. I make this merely as a passing criticism, not because it influences us either one way or the other in our position in the matter.

The history of joint debates in Oakland County has been that they are of little consequence so far as the settlement of any particular question is concerned. The Wet forces have not intended to conduct a speaking campaign and we intend to stick to our plans. We believe the people of this County have very largely made up their minds how they are going to vote. We are willing to trust to their judgment in that respect, so respectfully decline to aid the Dry cause, by becoming an adjunct to their propaganda.

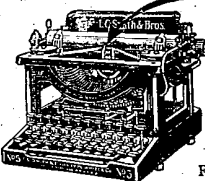
