## Can Legally Vote on Local Option

The constitution of the State of Michigan provides that a voter must have resided in the state SIX months and in the township or ward continuously TWENTY days next preceding the election-

#### PENALTY

The law provides that any person voting illegally, (hall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and may be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the

March 16 1915 was the last day a voter could move into a township or ward and vote April 5th.

Every voting place in Oakland County will be closely checked on April 5th and any person found trying to cast an illegal ballot will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.
