instruments.

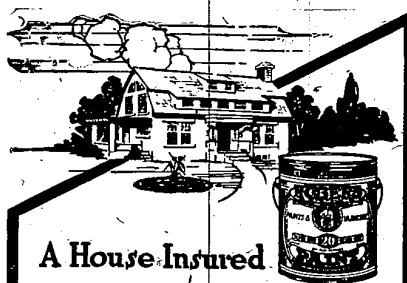
Despite the exceedingly anti-
