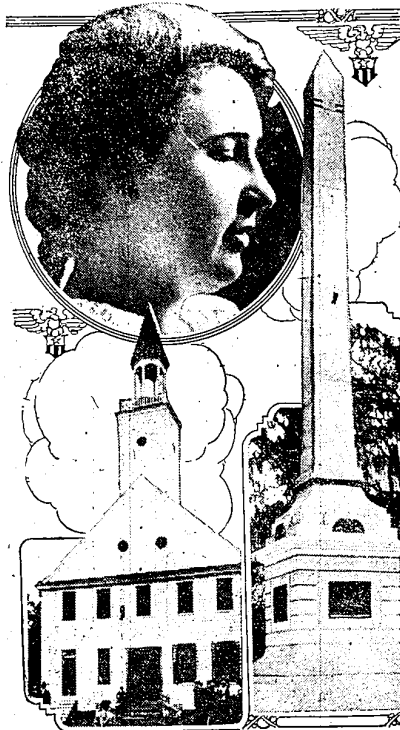


UNVEIL MONUMENT ERECTED BY U. S. IN MEMORY OF REVOLUTIONARY HEROES

In Japan They Alone May Give It—Are Taught in Special Schools.

All visitors to Japan will recall the sad, soft tones of the flutes at night, the forest glades and on the mountain paths. It is a melodious and plaintive tune, always the same, and it is heard only when night has enveloped these places in her shadows. It is the flute of the blind Anna San, the massage man and woman. For old men, hoary with age, to young girls in their teens, they wander, the blind people of Japan. By law, strictly enforced, they must be blind, either from birth or through some fatality due honorable living. Thus they gain an honorable living.

With perfect knowledge, gained by years of study in schools specially provided for them, they knead, twist and string every nerve, sinew and tendril in the human body. In two

hours' time they will create a new being, masterly in their manipulation of the tried traveler, the nervous, the exhausted and the nervous hypochondriac, of the woman suffering from neuralgia, sick headache or the weakness of a languid mind and body.

They will take charge of your body from the soles of your feet, and when their task is completed, they leave behind them a feeling of ease, of entire comfort, of placid well-being, which makes you very soon call them back again. Some of these girls are pretty and attractive and their helplessness makes them an additional charm. Their usual charges are forty sen per hour, in rural districts much less.

DOOMED TO BLINDNESS; GIRL STUDIES HARD

Expert's Cruel Verdict Arouses Her Ambition for More Learning.

Iowa City, Ia.—Slowly becoming blind, with perhaps a year before her sight is blotted out, Alma Krager of Burlington, Iowa, a freshman student in the liberal arts college of the State University, has announced her determination to spend the last days before blindness in pursuit of her studies at Iowa.

The facts of her pitiful situation were disclosed following the visit of a Chicago specialist who made an examination of her eyes and predicted what is next to a fatality itself. Nothing can be done to save her sight, it is said, and total blindness is due within the coming year.

The doctor's verdict came as a hard blow, but has not changed the girl's determination to spend her last days of sight in study here. Even now temporary blindness comes yet she still holds her place well at the head of her classes.

Last summer Miss Krager received a severe shock when a bolt of lightning struck but a few feet away from her during an electrical storm near her home. This, it appears, has affected the nerves controlling her eyesight and nothing can be done to ward off the impending blindness.

Smuggling Chinese.

Australia is perturbed by the discoveries of Mr. Lachlan, the commonwealth minister for external affairs, who has been inquiring into the illegal influx of Chinese. There is a wealthy organization in China with agencies in all the principal Australian ports and with the connivance of ships' officers the systematic smuggling of Chinese into Australia has been carried on for a long time.

The ships trading between Hong Kong and the Australian ports have been so cunningly supplied with false bulkheads, walls and floors that hiding rooms have been provided for eighty Chinese stowaways on a single voyage. Ship cooks have been secretly paid to supply the stowaways with food.

The trade is very profitable, as Australia is only a few days' steaming from China and many thousands of Melbourne are always ready to pay large sums and run all sorts of risks to get to the land of gold.

CAN A PUP INHERIT A KINK IN HIS TAIL

Rabbit Hound's Ownership is Disputed Because of a Marcol Twist in His Wiggler

Atlantic City, N. J.—Deciding that a pup could inherit a kink in its tail from a similar peculiarity attached to its father, no matter if the wagging did happen to receive the twist through an accident after "daddy" had reached his majority, District Court Judge Frank Smathers, after most careful consideration of the unique problem, awarded Elmer D. Sooy, of this city, a rabbit hound pup, to which both Sooy, and Thomas Hudson, of Pleasantville, claim ownership.

During the hearing of the case, Sooy trotted in a pudgy, round pupa hound which had an old curl in its wagging. Under cross-examination he testified that the peculiar kink was there because a third-rail trolley had run over it. The pup happened to have a similar Marcol to its tail.

Hudson, on the other hand, led in another supposed pup hound, which had blotches on the pup, and said it was this dog's offspring.

It was too much for the court to decide in one sitting, but the next day after his honor had spent his evening at home pondering over canine spots and tails, Sooy got the pup.

The animal is worth \$50, but the two men have spent more than three times that amount in their dispute over it, and Hudson says he will appeal and spend as much more, if necessary, to win.

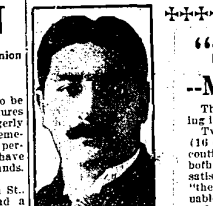
