Mrs. R. J. Foster visited relatives in Detroit Monday.

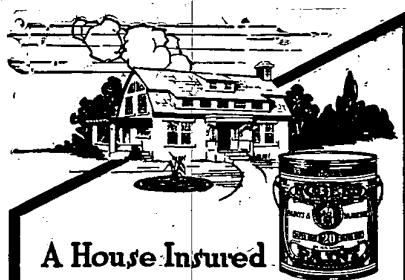
