Several persons have made the statement that a certain party of men in an auto who were later seen at Redford were Farmington visitors earlier in the evening. Whether these fears be grounded or unfounded, will never be known, but their possibility remains undoubted. The danger exists—it always has. The best means of fighting it is in being ready to face it. A good clean-up of old rubbish around stores and dwelling houses, which should include all unnecessary flammable matter, would be the most effective starter, followed by a compulsory and enforced ordinance along these lines. The purchase of an auto for the speedier transportation of the fire apparatus would not lessen in the least our feeling of security. The ruins at Redford bear mute testimony to the fact that immediate action is necessary.

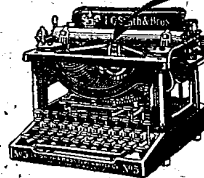

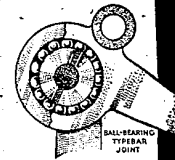
