

BEST SIZE OF SILO TO BUILD

Not Advisable to Construct Recep-tacle With Diameter Over Twenty Feet—Right Height

In building a sile one should plan well the width of the sile. If the sile is too wide for the number of stock to be fed from it daily, there will not be a sufficient amount of silage taken from the sile per day, especially in warm weather, to keep the silage from applies.

warm weather, to keep the shage from spoiling.
A depth of 2 to 2½ inches of silage should be taken from the silo per day during the winter months, and a depth of three inches per day during the warm summer months.

If the stock on a farm is equivalent to from ten to fifteen cows, the silo abould have a diameter of about ten feet; if equivalent to fitteen to twenty-five cows, a diameter of about tenty-five cows, a diameter of about tenty-five cows, a diameter of about tenty-five cows, a diameter of sibutien feet; if equivalent to thirty-five to forty-five cows, a diameter of sibuteen feet; if equivalent to forty-five to sity-five cows, a diameter of eighteen feet. For a bert of seventy-five cows or over the diameter gan be from eighteen to twenty feet.

It is not advisable to build a silo with the diameter over twenty feet. It is a general rule not to make the height of the silo less than twice or more than three times the diameter.


