There is every indication that Farmington is going to enjoy the biggest growth in the history of its

existence, and that the growth is now upon us, with the construction of from 30 to 50 houses assured for this summer, and the prospects ex-cellent if not certain for a much arger number next year. There ot a vacant house in the village, nor has there been for months. outhouses on private property and owned by the individual residing on said property, shall be kept clean and the vaults shall receive a daily treatment of fresh lime on other approved disinfectant, and their contents removed at least once monthly from March 1st to December 1st, inclusive during each and every year said privies and outhouses are used. Owners of residences renting the same shall be subject to the same rules and regulations. Whoever violates this regulation shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$10 oo for each and every offense."
