Postal laws will be of particular interest to farmers in this county right now: "Patrons of any office, who, on account of the establishment of or a change in rural delivery service, receive their mail from the rural carrier of another office, may have their of another omce, may have their mail of the second, third and fourth classes sent to the latter office for delivery by the rural carrier without a new prepayment of postage, provided they first file with the postmaster at the former with the postmaster at the former office a written request to that effect. This is not construed as forwarding within the meaning of the law."—Oxford Leader.

Plan New Wolverine Highway Covering 185 Miles Between Detroit and Grand Haven

The editor is in receipt of a ommunication from Alvah Brown, chairman of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Kent county, which deals with the proposed new Wolverine Highway from Detroit through Lansing, Grand Rapids and Grand Haven, who says that considerable favorable comment is being heard in that locality.

The road, if built, would divert great deal of automobile traffic that at present sees little of Michigan, and is worthy of serious conderation. Among other things the com-

unication says:
"The route would be largely over angling roads and the distance measures one hundred and eighty five miles from 'the Grand Haven dock to the City Hall in Detroit; about one hundred and fifty four will be country mileage and the balance through cities and villages.

The proposal is for building of concrete or otherwise constructing for permanency; it is suggested that a general meeting be held at Lansing in the near future to which interested parties would drive from all along the line and a permanent organization formed; in addition to this, a board of local control might be arranged for in each county or in each prominent xillage through which the foad

It is suggested that lithographed subscription blanks be gotten out in certificate form to be attached to the subscribers, letter head and arranged in leather cover slip-leaf binding, which would provide for the payment of one dollar or more, on the part of the signer, for each completed mile of concrete, bituminous or brick road sixteen feet wide; some men will sign for one dollar or more per mile for the full Commencing the week following stretch and others will subscribe the same or larger amounts for building on this route between certain towns or in specific counties; all construction would be made under plans of the State Highway Department.

The great motor travel, like the railroad traffic, is eastward and westward; the Wolverine Highway built to attract, will divert much of the touring through Michigan cities and villages that does not now touch our state; it would be worth as much to us as an electric railway along the same route.
