## Silo a Safe Investment

The silo is one of the farmer's best and safest investment. From a mere storehouse for winter roughage, it has become known as a weed seed eradicator and food cooker. It is a combined storehouse, self-cooker and laboratory. Fermentation, which starts as soon as the silo is filled and closely packed, causes the temperature to rise to an average of 150 degrees for a period of some three or four weeks. In this manner the contents are partially cooked and much of the coarse material otherwise wasted is converted into wholesome food.

Weed seed always abundant in silage is cooked by the intense heat and its germination destroyed. Then, too, the high temperature liberates certain acids. These act directly upon the silage disintegrates the woody fibers, liberates the cellulars and, in short, partially predigests the food.

The silo converts the waste roughage about the farm into stock food. It conserves space and makes feeding an easy chore. It provides succulent food through out the year regardless of season, reduces the cost of beef, pork and dairy products and paves the way for a better profit on the live stock and farming business.
