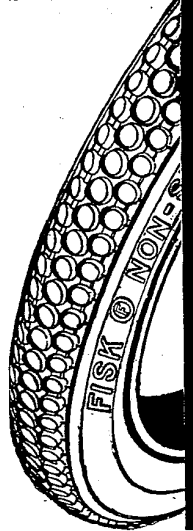
#### Now It's Potato Blight

There is an old saying that a dry season scares the farmers to death, but a wet season starves them to death. The experiences of many farmers in this locality this season gives some color of truth to the latter part of the statement. With bumper crops of wheat, rye and oats, many farmers have had these damaged by the rain, in some cases to a point approaching a total loss. Many promising fields of oats were laid in a tangled mass by the recent rains and it is almost impossible to harvest them.

Now comes the potato blight, which is reported to be the worse in many years. The continued wet weather has made a condition which is ideal for the blight and many fields of the crop are reported ruined. There is very little that can be done now to check the blight. Spraying for this purpose is effective chiefly as a preventative and has to be done before the blight spores find a lodgment in the plants.
