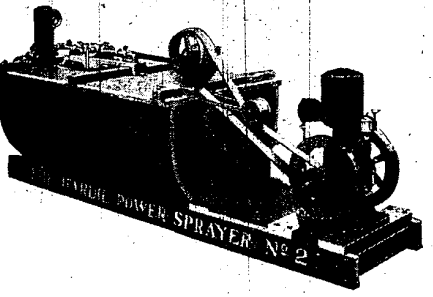

The "Hardie" Automatic Power Sprayer No. 2



THE PUMP is solid brass, mounted on a cast-iron base. The valves, which are brass ball valves, can be removed and replaced by the unscrewing of a single nut. The plunger is solid brass, packed with the best asbestos packing. A repacking nut at the end of the plunger cylinder makes it very easy to repack the plunger. The brass plunger rod is guided by a sliding cross head, running on milled ways.

THE RELIEF VALVE is used to regulate the pressure. The one we use on this sprayer is of our own invention and has all the good features and none of the troublesome features of other relief valves. The spring is placed outside where the liquid cannot possibly come in contact with it. The valve is a large brass ball, which rotates with the pressure, giving greater wearing surface than any other form of valve. Both the valve and valve-seat can be removed and new ones replaced without disconnecting any of the pipes and at a trifling cost. The relief valve can readily be adjusted to maintain any pressure up to 200 pounds.

NOZZLE PROTECTOR. This machine is equipped with our patented nozzle protector. This device makes it impossible for any particle of dust to reach the nozzles, doing entirely away with the trouble of nozzle clogging. All sediment is collected in the nozzle protector, and discharged from there on to the ground by simply opening a stop-cock.

AGITATOR. The agitator has a long, easy swinging motion across the bottom of the tank. It adds very little to the labor of the engine but thoroughly agitates the liquid.

PUMP JACK has cut gears, long babbitted bearings and machined pulleys.

THE TANK is made of 1 1/2 inch cypress and holds 150 gallons.

THE PLATFORM is made of hard wood, well bolted together. The length of the platform is 8 feet 6 inches.

THE ENGINE is 1 1/2 H. P.

BELT TIGHTENER. This machine is equipped with a belt-tightening device, consisting of idle pulleys, running in a hinged frame which rides on the top of the belt, automatically maintaining the proper tension of the belt. The belt we use is fabric which has been specially treated so that the moisture from the spray does not effect it.

This machine is equipped with everything to make it complete—Pressure gauge, oil cups, etc. It is arranged for two lines of hose and will supply from six to eight Vermorel nozzles at a pressure of from 100 to 200 pounds. It is built strong enough to stand constant work under high pressure; no detail has been overlooked which would make all of its parts convenient, yet we have maintained a simplicity throughout, that makes it easy to operate and take care of.
