The Ladies Literary club will meet with Mrs. Eva Lee, March 10. The program will consist of the bibliography of Rudyard Kipling and his works.

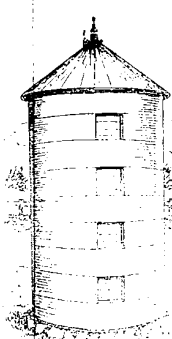
