The Russians have reached Kovel and the Austrians have evacuated Brody. The German aggressive on the eastern front has become notice ably weaker during the past fow days. The assaults upon Drinsk have been checked by the brilliant defense of General Russky; according to a dispatch from Petrograd.

Petrograd says Russian forces have recaptured almost entirely the fortress triangle which includes Duboo, Royno and Lutsk. In Galicia the Austrians have been driven back across the rivers which run parallel to the borders
