BETTER HOUSING IN INDIA

Government is Giving its Attention to Matter That Has Been Too Long Neglected.

One of the most prominent features connected with the present development of India is the zealous attention paid in some of the larger cities to providing more sanitary housing accommodations for workmen, says the Building Age. The need of this may perhaps be more readily understood by the statement that out of the total population of Bombay, 70 per cent live in one-room tenements, and many of the rooms are occupied by more than one family.

The tenement buildings in some instances are said to have their rooms constructed like the steerage quarters of a ship; that is, with bunks one over another. Bedrooms and kitchens are sometimes combined. Between the buildings are narrow passages into which all manner of refuse is thrown by the tenants and which are used for drainage purposes. That these dwellings are unfit for human habitation is well recognized by the municipal authorities of Bombay, and in order to provide better accommodations, sanitary "chawls" or tenements have been built for nearly twenty thousand persons. A "chawl" in India means a building so constructed as to be suitable for letting in separate tenements, each consisting of a single room or of two rooms, but not of more than two rooms.
